In December 2013, I solely developed and wrote a short film entitled *Apartment 8*, which can be found here: https://vimeo.com/91890811.

We shot in three days in early January 2014 and it was published to vimeo.com under Aardvark Stories' (my very unofficial production company) page on April 13 2014 at 11:50 PM. This short is an original work - if there is anything similar to it in terms of content, I'm unaware of it. As far as I'm aware, I retain the rights, though Vimeo's license does state this:

LICENSE TO VIMEO: As between you and Vimeo, you own the video content ("videos") that you submit to the Vimeo Service. By submitting a video, you grant Vimeo and its affiliates a limited, worldwide, non-exclusive, royalty-free license and right to copy, transmit, distribute, publicly perform and display (through all media now known or hereafter created), and make derivative works from your video for the purpose of (i) displaying the video within the Vimeo Service; (ii) displaying the video on third party websites and applications through a video embed or Vimeo's API subject to your video privacy choices; (iii) allowing other users to play, download, and embed on third party websites the video, subject to your video privacy choices; (iii) promoting the Vimeo Service, provided that you have made the video publicly available; and (iv) archiving or preserving the video for disputes, legal proceedings, or investigations.

Again, as far as I'm aware, Vimeo's rights mentioned above end if I remove the content from their website.

Furthermore, Vimeo also allows content creators to choose whether they would like Creative Commons licensing for their products. For the purposes of *Apartment 8*, I chose the Creative Commons 3.0 Attribution-NonCommercial-No Derivs, which means viewers are welcome to share the copy in any medium or format, but they must always provide attribution, cannot use the film for any commercial purposes, and any potential derivates are not allowed. To be honest, I'm not quite sure the legal strength of this, but I figured it couldn't hurt.

I have not formally filed for copyright, and even though I feel like I should through this assignment, I probably won't, being that I'm a poor college student.
